ROOM 4 BOOK REVIEW


The writing is a response to the book Home and Away and the theme of refugees








ROOM 4 FREE DIVING


Free Diving is an emotional, educational text set in the 1800. Written by Lorrae Coffin it tells the story of an Aboriginal man heading out to sea to gather pearls so he can earn his keep. This book explores the themes of bravery, black birding, human perseverance, and connecting to nature.

The pearl diver who lived in Broome was on a lugger with a colourful crew, he dove into the sea with a Malay man who made sure there was no threat coming. A Japanese man was also there who took the divers only communication with the boat through a rope. The diver didn't have any equipment to dive down, he only had his lungs to help. Sadly, he died because he got the bends from being pulled up too quickly. This story is very emotional and educational, it shows how it was back then collecting pearls.




Families are reminded that if your child is unwell with flu like symptoms that they stay home until their symptoms resolve.
